MILLION TREE CHALLENGE

In 2015, London's Million Tree Challenge continued to engage Londoners of all ages and backgrounds in the vision of a green legacy for the Forest City.

There were 21 new Partners who joined – nine businesses, eight community organizations, one institution and two media outlets – to support and promote this community-wide initiative for a total of 190 Partners by year-end.

Sponsorship of the Million Tree Challenge was strong in 2015 with Platinum level sponsors Scotiabank and the Richard and Beryl Ivey Fund, a fund within the London Community Foundation. There were also nine Supporting Sponsors each contributing \$1,000.

During the year, a total of 8,009 trees and seedlings



were given away at events such as the London Life Forest City Road Races, sponsored by RCC Waterproofing, and at the Western Fair sponsored by several MTC Partners. National Tree Day saw trees and seedlings given away by 16 Partners at 38 locations,

including four large giveaways by the City of London (founding Partner in London's Million Tree Challenge).

Media support was strong, including: many appearances on Rogers Daytime, *SCENE Magazine* and *OUR Coffee News* donated inkind advertising, *Business London Magazine* came on as a Partner and donated ad space for our Partner thank you ad in 2016, 102.3 JACKfm contributed significant in-kind support for MTC promotion, plus all the great ongoing coverage our media Partners gave the Challenge.

Partner actions were taken by almost half our Partners ranging from sponsoring a planting, direct donations, and event sponsorship to donating prizes, giving tree gifts and sponsoring seedlings, plus lots of other valuable actions to support and promote the Million Tree Challenge.

2015 was a year of increased collaboration and diversity, focused engagement, and growth helping to move London closer to the green legacy the Million Tree Challenge envisions. The tree counter kept increasing with a total of 281,676 trees registered by Londoners. Thank you to all Partners, funders, individuals and other supporters of the Million Tree Challenge.

NATURALIZATIONS & OTHER PLANTINGS

When ReForest London was formed ten years ago, we planted 2,002 native trees and shrubs in parks, industrial and institutional lands, roadways and neighbourhoods that year.

Ten years later, we are proud to report our incredible volunteers have more than tripled our annual impact. In 2015, we planted 6,941 native trees and shrubs in naturalizations and other projects.

With support of the City of London's new TreeMe program, and in partnership with London Middlesex Housing Corporation, we executed two of our most meaningful projects of the year. Residents of Southdale and Boullee Family Housing Communities were deeply engaged in improving their own community in deciding and planting two new meeting circles and 51 new yard trees. Making much needed improvement to their community was a powerful experience for them and helping them do it was incredible for us too.

Working with the Westminster Township Historical Society, the Lambeth Community Association and Rotary, we also created the new Lambeth Community Memorial Forest along Dingman Creek at Ashwood Manor, a retirement home in Lambeth, which will create a long-lasting legacy for Lambeth residents. We are excited by these new types of projects, and hope to do many more like them in the future!

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

ReForest London engaged with many Londoners at events throughout the City in 2015. We had a community booth at 40 events, such as Seedy Saturday, TVDSB Envirothon, UWO Earth Day, Go Wild Grow Wild, Forest City Road Races, the Pride Parade, Western Fair and many more! ReForest London reached an estimated 11,200 people at these events, and engaged with 385 new Twitter followers, 651 new Facebook followers and grew our newsletter list as well.

At these community booths, ReForest London volunteers spoke to the public about the importance of planting native trees and reminded Londoners to register their trees at milliontrees.ca. ReForest London also advocated for the City of London to fund their own Urban Forest Management Strategy (UFMS), and engaged 17,000 community members to email and call their City Councillors. The City decided to allocate 3.4 million dollars towards the UFMS, and we thank the community for speaking for trees.

NEIGHBOURHOOD TREE BLITZ

In June 2015, ReForest London volunteers planted over 400 trees in neighbourhood yards, instantly impacting an entire community's future in just one day. Over 80 volunteers helped plant trees in low-canopied neighbourhoods over two weekends in the rain and sunshine. This pilot was a great success, and led to a large grant from the Ontario Trillium Foundation for 2016 - 2018 to plant trees in low tree canopy neighbourhoods.

Over 40% of the land in London is residential, so a healthy urban forest has to include front and back yards. Over our ten year history, ReForest London has held tree sales, seedling giveaways and treecycle programs to provide low cost and free trees to homeowners. This new program will allow ReForest London to plant over 11,000 trees in London's least leafy neighbourhoods.

Trees in front and back yards make a profound impact on a neighbourhood and they provide ecological benefit to us all.

TREE SALES

Community tree sales and giveaways bring trees and planting expertise to Londoners in their own neighbourhoods, removing barriers to tree planting through a community-building event. These new trees will improve environmental and human health, provide shade and places for children to play as well as beautify our neighbourhoods and streets.

In 2015, we held six tree sales; four of them were hosted by schools as part of their activities in the School Community Tree Challenge. A total of 546 trees were sold at our sales in 2015. Student volunteers assisted with event setup and had the opportunity to learn about some of our native trees.

Tree sale hosts included: Go Wild Grow Wild, St. Marguerite d'Youville Catholic School, Northridge Public School, Argyle Community Association, Victoria Public School/Old South Community Organization, and Lord Roberts Public School.

GIFT OF A TREE

Despite the threat of rain on May 30, 2015, over 430 people came to plant a tree for a loved one in the Celebration Forest, located behind Parkwood Institute. The ceremony honoured 173 individuals and celebrated 68 individuals, organizations and businesses.

Daniel Kinsley, an avid outdoorsman who passed away in 2015, was honoured by family and friends with 22 trees planted in the Celebration Forest. One of Daniel's children told a touching story about him at the ceremony.

Our lead tree gift donor in 2015 was Dr. Carlo Pavan, a dentist in Sherwood Forest Mall who purchased nine large trees in memory of clients.

Thom McClenaghan, who has worked tirelessly to improve the Coves area in London for the last 20 years, was the Tree Hero for 2015.

All honourees were acknowledged during the ceremony and their names appear on the dedication signage and online. Everyone who came out was able to plant their tree before the skies erupted and it poured for an hour.

SCHOOL COMMUNITY TREE CHALLENGE

The School Community Tree Challenge is a collaborative program between ReForest London, Middlesex London Health Unit, Upper Thames River Conservation Authority, Thames Valley District School Board, and London District Catholic School Board. Elementary and secondary schools across London & Middlesex County are empowered and enabled, with some tree expertise and some kickstarter funding, to plan and implement tree planting projects in schoolyards, parks, and throughout the community.

In 2015, 21 schools across London participated in 50 different tree planting projects. We had a very busy spring and fall planting season, with students planting 346 trees and shrubs in their schoolyards and over 750 trees in community parks. Schools also hosted tree sales in order to fundraise and achieve their tree goals.

In January 2015 we launched the school growing program, which saw over 3,500 tree seedlings

planted in schools across London. Students raised their baby trees through the winter and spring months in their classrooms, before distributing throughout their communities in the spring, for planting in residential yards.

In total, over 5,200 student and staff volunteers participated in planting, growing, selling or giving away 5,320 trees through this program, making for a huge impact in our first year!

VOLUNTEERS

ReForest London's volunteers were busy planting trees, educating the public and promoting the Million Tree Challenge. We had over 7,900 volunteers contribute over 13,000 hours to our programs this past year which is over double last year's contributions! The majority of our new volunteers came from the School Community Tree Challenge, which means the youth of London were very busy improving our natural environment.

Our volunteers assisted at park, school and neighbourhood tree plantings, at tree aftercare and maintenance, at outreach booths, at tree sales and seedlings giveaways and many other events. There's something for everyone at ReForest London, whether you want to work outdoors digging holes or inside with tree planting metrics!

There were also many more volunteer groups at tree planting and tree aftercare events in 2015. Over 65 volunteer groups signed up to help at an event, which is a great team building exercise and a great way to give back to the London community.
