

The Celebration Forest



Established in May 2011, the Celebration Forest is an ongoing naturalization project sponsored by

donors who wish to plant trees in memory or incelebration of loved ones. The forest is located in London, Ontario, adjacent to the Westminster Ponds Environmentally Significant Area, behind St. Joseph's Health Care London's Parkwood Hoopital. Each year, hundreds of trees are planted in memory and in celebration, making it a living, breathing monument to its honourees.



Avoid

These are non-native species that have or may become invasive problem weeds in southwestern Ontario

They grow fast and reproduce readily. When they escape into the wild they out-compete native species and disrupt local ecosystems.

These trees should not be planted under any circumstances and should be removed when ossible to prevent further inva

At Risk

The following species are listed under the Endangered Species Act.

If you are hoping to plant one of these species, it is important that you ensure the plant has been grown in an ethical meaner from non-wild sources, that you plant it somewhere it is likely to survive and that you don't use if for naturalization projects except under licence from the Ministry of Natural Resources.

It is illegal to possess, transport, collect, buy sell any part of a living or dead member of a list species if it originates from wild sources in Ontar

Plant Planting a seedling

Seedlings are small trees, usually less than 15 cm tall. They come in small pots or as plugs wrapped in plastic or burlap. It is very important that you plant these trees right away, as the plugs can dry out very quickly. Dig a small hole, twice as wide as the pot or plug. Plant the seedling only as deep as the level of the soil – neither too deep nor too shallow. Roots should not be exposed. You may want to protect seedlings with a tomato cage to keep pets, children, and lawn equipment from crushing them.



Planting a sapling

Saplings are a bit larger, usually sold in 4 litre (1 gallon) pots. Remove any sod and then dig a hole twice as wide as the container, and about the same depth. You can check to ensure your hole is the correct depth by placing the tree in the hole and lining up the soil level in the container with the ground level. Carefully remove the pot; avoid pulling on the trunk. Once removed from the container, check the roots. If the roots are tightly compressed or "potbound", use your fingers to carefully tease the fine roots away from the tight mass and then spread the roots prior to planting. Seat the plant in the hole and back-fill the original soil. Mix in some compost if you wish. Fill hole only to the soil level of the original container. Compress soil gently using your hands.

Planting larger trees

Trees can also come in wire baskets and burlap. These should be planted as above, but you do not need to remove the wire basket. It helps keeps the root ball intact as you plant the tree. Once the tree is settled into the hole, cut back as much of the burlap as you can, and fold back the wire loops so they don't stick out of the ground. Fill in the hole, packing and watering as you backfill to allow the soil to settle.

Care

Mulch

Surround your tree with a thick "donut" of mulch. The mulch should not touch the tree, as it can not the bark and kill the tree. Use at least 10 cm of mulch. Mulch keeps moisture in and discourages weeds. Add new mulch each season as needed.



Water

The most important gift you can give to a new tree is water. Use a hose adjusted to trickle water slowly, or drill holes into the bottom of a 15 litre (5 gallon) bucket to water the tree slowly. Place the hose or the bucket on the ground near the base of the tree. Fill the bucket and allow it to drain or let the hose trickle for 30 minutes. Trees need to be watered each week throughout the late spring, summer, and early fall unless there has been a significant rainfall. As the tree grows larger, set the water along the dripline – the area under the edge of the outer branches – this is where the tree will soak up the most water.

Protect

New trees need our protection. Keep weed trimmers and lawnmowers at least a metre away from the base of the tree (a circle of mulch is a good way to remind yourself to do this). Don't allow children to play on the branches until they are well-established and able to withstand weight. Do not trim a tree without researching tree trimming methods, and never cut the leader (also called "topping" or "pollarding") off the top of the tree.

How to Plant a Tree



Why Plant a Tree?

Planting a tree in your yard brings many benefits to your family, your neighbourhood, and your community. Trees make an immediate difference for your home and community, and their value increases over time.



Increased privacy

Trees create a natural curtain of green between you and your neighbours, shielding both sights and sounds.



Lower heating and cooling costs

Deciduous trees planted on the south and west side of a home can decrease your cooling costs by up to 50%. Evergreen trees planted as wind breaks around homes can decrease your heating costs by as much at 30%.



More shade

Besides lowering cooling costs inside the house, shade from trees cools your yard too, making it more pleasant to eat, play, work, and relax outside.



Higher property values

A well-treed lot can increase your property value by as much as 20% and help to beautify your neighbourhood streetscape. Once you start digging, you'll find your neighbours will too!



Safer streets

Well-treed streets encourage pedestrian and bicycle traffic and improve sense of safety. Tree-lined streets slow traffic. Children are more likely to walk to school on well-treed streets.



Cleaner air and water

Trees store carbon dioxide and release oxygen back into the air. They remove dust and particulates, and absorb ozone, carbon monoxide, sulfur dioxide and other pollutants from our air. Trees clean water by filtering runoff and sediment from slopes next to streams, and recharging groundwater.



Better quality of life


Study after study shows that well-treed communities are safer and healthier. Trees create a sense of "place" and become community landmarks and living heritage. Trees also filter noise and soften harsh urban landscapes.

The Emerald Ash Borer Kills Ash Trees

The beetle is a highly destructive insect, native to Asia. It was first discovered in the Windsor, Ontario/ Detroit, Michigan area in 2002 and has since killed millions of ash trees in North America. This pest is a major economic and environmental threat to

Adult beetles emerge from trees in May. They feed, mate and lay eggs in crevices of the bark. Once the eggs hatch, the larvae feed under the bark, creating

urban and forested areas.

Actual size 8.5 - 13.5 mm tunnels, which cut off the flow of nutrients, causing the tree to die.

The greatest risk of

spreading the emerald ash borer is through moving ash nursery stock and forest products,


