MILLION TREE CHALLENGE

In 2017, the Million Tree Challenge (MTC) tree count almost surpassed the population of London with 383,068 trees planted and registered! This community-wide challenge continues to engage Londoners in the vision of a green, healthy and leafy community.

Million Tree Challenge Partners and supporters backed tree planting in London in a variety of ways including direct donations, funding park naturalizations, sponsoring tree giveaways, planting trees on their own property, sponsoring events, donating in-kind products or services, volunteering and helping to promote the MTC.

The power of the Million Tree Challenge is community collaboration. In 2017, 380 actions were taken by ~200 London businesses and organizations. This is remarkable community action. Platinum level sponsor, the Richard and Beryl Ivey Fund, a fund through the London Community Foundation, continued to lead support of this important initiative. Cornerstone Architecture became a Silver level sponsor with a five year pledge.

National Tree Day supports London's Million Tree Challenge and the goal of people planting trees on private property (and of course adding all their newly planted trees to our official count!).

In one day, 12 different Partners gave away a total of 3,170 trees/seedlings at 27 locations. This included 1,205 trees by the City of London and 895 trees by ReForest London. Getting more trees on residential lands is key to growing our urban forest.

Two other large seedling give-aways were the Forest City Road Races ,where 1,000 seedlings sponsored by MTC Partner Bentley Hearing Services were given to race registrants, and the Western Fair, where five different MTC Partners sponsored some of the 600 seedlings given to fairgoers to plant and register.

Thank you to all Partners and supporters of London's Million Tree Challenge for making 2017 another active year with much development, collaboration and growth.



NATURALIZATIONS & OTHER PLANTINGS

When we began in 2005, ReForest London and our volunteers planted just over 2,000 native trees and shrubs across London in parks, neighbourhoods and industrial areas. With great pride, we can announce that in 2017, we once again were able to increase our annual planting impact to 7,130 native trees and shrubs!

In 2017, in celebration of both Canada's and Ontario's 150th birthday, ReForest London did a naturalization planting in each of London's 14 wards thanks to special funding through Ontario 150 Community Celebration Program, the City of London, and the Government of Canada's EcoAction program. We had a great turnout for these plantings with local councillors joining us and were able to serve some delicious birthday cupcakes too.

A group comprised of members from 10 different religious organizations, along with Western's Circle K International Club, came together on a sunny day in September to plant trees at Peppertree Park. These volunteers from many faiths gathered to learn more about each other's beliefs, to plant

native trees and shrubs and share food and fellowship. A huge thank you to all the volunteers for their hard work transforming a section of the park into a leafy, green baby forest! Over the past five years, the interfaith community has planted 1500 trees and shrubs together throughout London.

Londoners love trees and in 2017 we had 1820 volunteers out to our planting events including 52 volunteer groups. We held 36 planting events at 28 sites which encompassed 6 watersheds and 11 neighbourhoods.

All these planting projects clean our air and water, help our urban forest adapt to climate change, create wildlife habitat, improve our neighbourhoods and increase London's woodland and tree canopy cover. We are grateful to all the sponsors who supported these projects in 2017 including:

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

ReForest London once again took part in dozens of community events across the city in 2017. In total, we had a community booth at 36 events, including Seedy Saturday, Go Wild Grow Wild, Forest City Road Races, Aboriginal Solidarity Day, Gathering on the Green, Western Fair, volunteer fairs and many more! In all, we reached over 7,000 people who we spoke to about the importance of being part of London's Million Tree Challenge by getting trees, planting trees and of course registering those trees. Our volunteers helped us give away 3,737 seedlings at several of these events.

In addition to these events, with the support of Ontario150 funding, ReForest London held its first ever Forest Festival. The goal of the event was to celebrate and bring awareness to our province's trees and forests by providing a plethora of fun activities and interesting vendors. Over 500 people were in attendance, and we enjoyed a free tree-themed lunch provided by the amazing Growing Chefs! Ontario.

GIFT OF A TREE

For the seventh year, hundreds of people gathered for the annual Celebration Forest Event to honour their loved ones by planting trees in their name. All honourees were acknowledged during the ceremony and their names appear on the dedication signage and online.

This planting is one of most meaningful ways for people to pay tribute to others through trees. Celebration Forest trees are planted for many reasons - in memory of someone dear who has passed, in celebration of a birth, wedding, birthday, or other milestone, and by businesses in celebration and in memory of clients, employees and colleagues. A tree really is the perfect gift!

The two events attracted approximately 450 guests, and were made possible by the work of 75 volunteers and staff. The ceremony preceding the planting was made extra special with a poem written and read by local poet Olha Nowosad, called "Trees."

A huge thank you to event sponsors St. Williams Nursery & Ecology Centre, Ontario150 and Lanktree Tree Services for their generous support.

NEIGHBOURHOOD RELEAF

We had a very busy 2017! In spring and fall, we gave away or planted 6,636 free trees through the Neighbourhood ReLeaf program to 2,283 households. We were supported by 287 volunteers who gave over 1,300 hours of their time to make their communities leafier. We believe that our Neighbourhood ReLeaf program is the biggest of its kind in Canada.

TREE DEPOTS

We held 25 Tree Depots in spring and fall where 4,505 trees were given away. Over 45 species of native and fruit trees were available, including everything from Pawpaws to Tulip trees!

We also offered two Fruit Tree Care Workshops and three General Tree Care Workshops to Londoners who were interested to learn more about keeping their trees healthy and happy. We want the trees residents are planting to create a greener city. This means we also need to educate people on how to be great tree caretakers so a leafy legacy will be a reality for the Forest City.

TREE BLITZES

Volunteer wagon teams visited 14 low-canopy neighbourhoods where a total of 1,873 trees found new homes. Planted by volunteers at residents' homes or given out at Blitz event headquarters, homeowners were thrilled to get new trees. In addition to the wagon teams, volunteer truck drivers delivered and planted trees across London for anyone who needed help. We also can't forget our elite team of GIS volunteers who created route maps for the Blitz wagon teams, and who entered data into our database and registered each tree into the Million Tree Challenge.

In keeping with our mission to enhance human health through the benefits of trees, we connected with community efforts to increase food security and access to healthy food and provided, delivered or planted 100 fruit trees to members of London's Child and Youth Network.

The Neighbourhood ReLeaf program would not be possible without the generous support of the Ontario Trillium Foundation, the Richard & Beryl Ivey Fund – a fund within the London Community Foundation, Healthy Kids Community Challenge, and City of London (TreeMe Program).

SCHOOL COMMUNITY TREE CHALLENGE

2017 was truly a banner year of tree planting and learning activities with school groups in our community. Over 5,000 students of all ages participated in 67 unique projects. Schools grew seedlings in their classrooms, planted native trees and shrubs in schoolyards, parks and natural areas, hosted tree giveaways in partnership with our Neighbourhood ReLeaf program, and participated in educational tree hikes at ReForest London. We are pleased to report that 5,454 new trees and shrubs were planted and distributed by students, parent volunteers, and school staff through the School Community Tree Challenge program.

While the whole year was full of amazing work with students, one of our highlights was the park naturalization project at West Lions Park in May where over 200 trees and shrubs were planted by students from Jeanne Sauvé French Immersion Public School and Eagle Heights Public School. This event was a great way to honour Canada's and Ontario's 150th birthday, by setting down roots and planting trees for future generations of Londoners, Ontarians and Canadians. Students

had a great time and were excited to be giving back to their community.

In Fall, we welcomed nine school groups of students in Grades 4-8 to participate in a free field trip which featured a nature hike and tree planting. Students learned how to identify eight different native trees, then planted trees with their class near the Celebration Forest. It was a lovely way to cap off the fall and we had tons of fun getting our hands dirty with students in this new type of activity.

VOLUNTEERS

Volunteers made another successful year possible through the donation of over 13,000 hours of their time. In total, 6,463 volunteers completed 7,731 different actions - all to make London a healthier place. A significant portion of these hours were contributed by school groups, where the next generation of tree planters was cultivated.

Our volunteers directly plant and care for thousands of trees, but they also do so much more to make what ReForest London does possible. Some of the ways volunteers help include assisting residents to choose the right tree for their property, speaking with the public at outreach events, helping in the office, creating maps, giving tree presentations, helping with transportation, serving on the board and committees, and even wearing the tree mascot costume!

Volunteering to plant trees attracts many different people as it is such a fulfilling activity – it's easy, straight forward, good exercise, and makes a difference. Helping our earth, having a feeling of accomplishment and being community-minded are rewards volunteers share.

FINANCIAL REPORT

Some of the numbers in our financials for 2017 look quite different than past years and that's a direct result of our partnership with Thames Talbot Land Trust to establish an Environment and Sustainability Centre for London. The project is early days but we have secured some major funding to establish the project and this is reflected in our cash position as well as our deferred contributions. These funds are for capital projects next year.

Excluding the new project, ReForest London still had strong revenue growth in 2017. A portion of the increase is a one-time bump attributable to Canada and Ontario 150 celebration funding for planting trees and connecting Canadians to nature.

Our full financial statements provide clear year over year transparency for ReForest London operations versus our new Environmental Centre project. ReForest London has an active Finance and Audit Committee and our annual financial statements are audited by PricewaterhouseCoopers LLC.

LOOKING AHEAD

ReForest London and Thames Talbot Land Trust are partnering to establish London's first and only environmental education centre where our offices are located on 5.6 hectares of land adjacent to the Westminster Ponds ESA. This is an opportunity to create a remarkable new amenity for London and area and more importantly, to create a profound impact on our community by modelling, teaching and leading urban sustainability.

The Centre will honour its natural, built and cultural heritage, including the story of veterans and the site's provenance of nature appreciation and health care. The entire project will take several years to accomplish with the first phase launching in 2018.

In 2017, ReForest London embarked on a one-year study to explore whether the Wellington County Green Legacy Program, a hugely successful tree growing program which involves school children and community volunteers, can be replicated in London to realize our goal of planting a million new trees in the Forest City.

There are lots of exciting things on the horizon for 2018 and beyond!
