A SENSE OF SCALE...










Total size of London:

- ~ 42,000 ha
- At 1,080 trees (saplings) per ha
 - Need 926 ha (2% of land)

Equivalent to:

- 154 Victoria Parks
- 50 White Oaks Malls; or
- 6 UWOs (main campus)

What is a tree?






- Height?
- Woody?
- Girth?
- Number of stems?
- Actually:

A somewhat arbitrary classification of a woody plant!



What is a tree?





For the purposes of the MTC:
 All individuals of the species must be perennial and have woody stems, and individuals of the species typically reach a height of 4.5 m (15 feet) or more if left untrimmed

(Compare to shrubs, vines)

What is a native tree?






For the purposes of the MTC:
 A native tree is defined as a tree species which naturally occurred in Ontario prior to European settlement.

 Note: not all trees which are native to Ontario naturally occur in the London area.

What is a forest?





- A type of terrestrial ecosystem dominated by trees
- Many different organisms
- Many different vertical layers
 - (Canopy, understorey, shrub/sapling layer, ground layer)
- May also include:
 - Swamps
 - Savannas

Trees & the Forest City





- Today in the urban area:
 - -4.4 million trees
 - -12 trees per person
 - -25% canopy cover
- Ontario: Forest cover has been reduced from 80% to 11%

Major Challenges








Today in London:

- -8% woodland cover
- Most common species:
 - By stem count: European
 Buckthorn
 - By leaf cover: Norway
 Maple
- Massive loss of ash trees;
 possibility of ALB

How to Plant a Tree






- Plant the right time of year
- Pick the right tree for the location
 - Sun / Soil / Water
 - Height/shape
 - Spacing (1/3 max crown)

In your kit: "Choosing the Right Tree"

Right Species in Right Spot: SUN





- Sun is from the south!
- Shade from:
 - Buildings
 - Fences
 - Other plants

 Plant deciduous trees to the south and evergreens to the north of your home. (Why?)

Right Species in Right Spot: SOIL & WATER








- Soil affects drainage and nutrients
- Texture:
 - Sand
 - Silt
 - Clay
- Gardener's test for soil
- Slope affects water

Right Species in Right Spot: UTILITIES





- on1call.com to submit FREE public utilities locate request
 - Keep overhead utilities in mind as well

- Avoid planting directly over any dangerous utility (such as gas or buried electric)
- But plants are okay to grow over them

How to Plant a Tree







- Dig a hole
 - 2x width, 1x height
 - Messy is better
 - Test hole by placing pot inside
- Remove plant
 - Note: this is the wrong way to remove a plant from its pot!

How to Plant a Tree







- Loosen roots (esp. if pot bound)
- Place plant in hole
- Make sure plant is straight
- Backfill
- Tamp (firmly)
- Remove all twine and tags
- Add tree collar or o-tube
- Mulch donut
- Water

How to Tell if a Tree is Alive





How to Buy a Tree






- Bare root (~\$2-\$10)
- Potted (~\$10 \$30)
- Balled & Burlap ("B&B")
 - (~\$200 \$400)
 - -Also: "Caliper"
- Spaded (\$1000s)

How to Care for a Tree: The 4 Ws







WATERING

- Once a week in warm weather if it hasn't rained
- Esp. first 2-3 years to help get established

WEEDING

- Reduces competition
- Top up mulch

How to Care for a Tree: The 4 Ws





WEED-WHACKING

– A fast way to kill trees!

WILDLIFE

- Tree collars (white or Otube)
- Wildlife repellants

In your kit: Tree Guards Fact Sheet

Outside!





- Soil tests
- Emerald Ash Borer
- European Buckthorn
- Quality control:
 - -Tree collars
 - Mulching
 - Leaning towers
- Norway vs. Sugar Maples







- Check in with RFL staff at start
 - T-shirt or yellow vest
 - Positive attitude ©
- Set-up phase:
 - Help sort or mix trees at start
 - Unload equipment
 - Fill mulch buckets/wheelbarrows
 - Possibly: place trees or dig holes





During Event:

- Quality control
- Special assignments:
 - Photos & stories
 - Volunteer count
 - Planting demo
 - Skoot
 - Bareroot or infill teams
- Demo for new arrivals





First 30 Minutes: quality control

- Are trees straight?
- Is collar right height?
- Are tags removed?
- -Mulch donuts





"We can only love what we know."

- Teach volunteers about their tree
- Help ensure safety
- Direct Qs to staff if needed
- At end of event, check for abandoned equipment and tags
- Rain dates



Tree Depot or Sales





- Project Leader: Skylar Franke
- Arrival time <u>very</u> important
- Set-up: General
 - Meet staff ~1.5 hours before event
 - Check the game plan
 - Unload trailer
 - Set up event signage

Tree Sales





Set-up: Plants

- Sort by species
- Leave space between rows
- Small pots at front, larger pots at back
- Add species signs
- Add tags (tie-on to large, stakes onto small)
- Remove popsicle sticks
- Keep customers from moving plants until inventory is done

Tree Sales



"Floor" Team:

- Wanders & answers questions
- Provide species suggestions (see pre-order list for species)

Table Team:

- Makes sure people get the take home info they need
- Explains Million Tree Challenge
- Encourages them to register

All Events





- Make sure other volunteers are learning and having fun
- Encourage participation in Million Tree Challenge (milliontrees.ca)
- Talking to someone with a potential project?
 - Direct them to Amber

Common Questions





"What are the black spots on my maple?"

- Tar spot disease
 - Fungal infection
- Affects all types of maples
 - Norway Maple the worst
- Little effect on tree health (just ugly)
- Fungus spores from fallen leaves in spring
- Raking

Common Questions







"Do I need to cut down my ash tree?"

- Only affects true ash (Fraxinus), not mountain-ash (Sorbus)
- Hope is for resistant trees
- 90%+ expected to die
- Brittle/falling branches
- Injection with TreeAzin an option

Common Questions







- Species grow at different rates
- Some require larger pots while still small (hickories, tap roots)
- Sometimes plants will grow more in girth than height



- Tree Teachers + Hikes


